# **NOVEMBER IS A GREAT MONTH**

WHEN WE REFLECT ON MONTHS in the measurement of chronos, we can say that every month is good for one reason or another. I feel that November is a really great. We celebrate so many fantastic ecclesiastical feast days—Kosmas and Damianos, Saint Nektarios, Saint John Chrysostom, Philip, Matthew and Andrew the Apostles, the Entrance of the Theotokos, and our Patron Saint Katherine. November is also great because of Thanksgiving and our Annual Dinner Dance Gala, with our honorees Sophia Tsangali and Nick Larigakis. We have so many people who contribute to the life of our Saint Katherine community, but it is a good thing to lift up a few people to honor yearly.

November is a great month, but December is even greater. We have many feast-days and other events. We all know of the feastday of the Nativity of our Lord. A special event in December is Stewardship Sunday on December 6 (the feastday of Saint Nicholas the Wonderworker). I did not choose to write about Stewardship Sunday because it is my favorite celebration, but out of pure necessity. If we do not celebrate our stewardship commitment as an expression of who we are, and the acknowledgement of our faith as living Christian men, women, and children of God, why would we even think to celebrate any of the above for mentioned feast days? Since most of us need to prepare for financial commitments ahead of time, I would like to offer some reflections.

The Divine Liturgy of Saint Basil the Great includes beautiful silent prayers expressing the Church's concern for the family: "...remember, Lord, the people here present and those that are absent with good cause. Have mercy on them and on us according to the multitude of your mercies, fill their store-houses with every good thing; maintain their marriage-bonds in peace and concord; nurture the infants; instruct the young, strengthen the aged, encourage the faint-hearted, gather together again those that are scattered; bring back those who went astray and unite them to Your holy, catholic and apostolic church; defend the widows; protect the orphans...." As Orthodox Christians, we are also stewards of our Church family those with whom we worship, fellowship and serve the community. In the same way that we care for our immediate family, we also care for our Christian brothers, sisters, fathers, mothers, sons and daughters. In his book on the Eucharist/Divine Liturgy, Fr. Alexander Schmemann explains that in the early church, the Eucharistic sacrifice was offered by all the members of the church. Each person coming to the gathering of the church brought with them everything they could spare for the needs of the church. This meant for the sustenance of the clergy, widows and orphans, for helping the poor, and for all the good works of the Church. This is the Church that we Orthodox Christians claim to be.

In the Gospel of Saint Matthew (6:19), Jesus instructs us, "Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust destroy, and where thieves break in and steal...." Often in life, we pursue and collect those things that do not last. We must ask, "One hundred years from now, where will our possessions be?" Our great-

# FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL PRESIDENT

WE'RE IN THE "HOMESTRETCH!" November is upon us and as year's end approaches, I wanted to take a few moments to talk to you about stewardship and why it is important to our community.

As you all know, our church and the abundance of ministries we enjoy cannot survive without the continued love and support of our parishioners. Your parish council is proactively exploring ways to make it easier for you to remain connected with our church family. This year, **Stewardship Sunday will be held on December 7**. As is our practice, we'll have a guest speaker and host a breakfast for the parish as we request you consider your family's blessings and make your stewardship pledges for the coming year in support of our community and its ministries. In the weeks leading up to this event, many of you will have received your 3rd quarter stewardship statements as a reminder of your donations to date, while still others who have not been stewards in any form for a year or more, have also been personally contacted in an attempt to encourage their renewed participation in the life of our church. By the time many of you read this, our online registration form will have been introduced on our website as a means of ensuring your family's contact information is up to date. We are also expecting publication of our Catalogue of Ministries later this month, as well as the debut of a new and simpler online donations program.

Last February, I wrote a rather extensive article which focused on the multiple aspects of stewardship in our community and how the Church teaches our stewardship responsibilities may be fulfilled in any number of ways, by means of your **involvement** through offerings of your personal time, talents, and financial gifts. I discussed the diverse elements comprising our parish as well as the richness of our ministries which are supported through your time and talents. Inevitably however, we must "render unto Caesar" (in this case, our vendors, suppliers, and service providers, etc.) payments necessary to sustain our community. Detailed insight into our budget indicated how much was required to run our community on a daily basis (over \$3,300/day). The article also showed that our parish's largest source of revenue comes from our stewardship program (44%), with fundraising activities (festivals and rentals, etc.) responsible for almost 40% of our revenues. On the heels of a Fall Festival that experienced poor turnout and lower revenues due to terrible weather, I derive no pleasure in recalling my comments in that February article "...relying on fundraising for that large a portion of our budget is somewhat risky, particularly since weather can be a major factor in the success of many fundraising activities." The thrust of these comments was intended as support for our firm belief that "... our ultimate objective must be to attain 100% of our operating budget solely from our stewardship program." I then wrote:

Now for some frank talk. Changing the stewardship giving paradigm rests with all of us and depends on our understanding and appreciation of the many advantages so prevalent in our parish. Often, when a new steward comes to our community, one of the first questions asked is "How much is stewardship?" Well, as we all know, there are no "dues"—there is no set amount...your gift of your time, talents, and treasures is between you and God...but we certainly encourage involvement in the life of our community to the maximum extent possible. Your generosity in all three areas in recognition of the abundant offerings in our parish is the ultimate expression of your stewardship. To that end, we have approximately 800 families in our community...a simple calculation reveals that—on average—it costs about \$1,500 per family to sustain our parish. While many give that amount and more, a majority does not, hence our dependence on fundraising activities. In this context, even slight increases in giving can make a big difference to our community. Furthermore, while we do our best to control costs, our church is not immune to the yearly increases for goods and services. Please keep in mind that if we all give the same amount each year without taking such factors into consideration, the church is put at a significant disadvantage and must find other ways to realize those revenues. The sad reality is that many have not increased their donations in over 12 years (since stewardship began). Please consider this the next time you give and if larger donations of your treasures are not possible, then increased donations of your time and talents will be gratefully accepted.

Please contemplate your blessings carefully as you reflect on the extent to which you will be **involved** (by means of your time, talent, and treasures) in the life of our community. We are blessed with an incredible community and our greatest enemy is complacency and taking for granted the many wonderful aspects of this parish. If we are truly grateful for the blessings God has bestowed upon all of us and our community as we consider our stewardship obligations, your pledges of time, talent, and treasures will surely be sufficient to sustain us for the coming year.

### LEARNING WITH PAIDEIA CURRICULUM

Circle Time. The morning prayer is a warm welcome for all students and staff so that they are inspired by it. Circle time also includes the "Calendar Activities" which introduce Math, Language and Social Science. The students dress up "Telemahos" the frog with the seasonal clothes and the seasonal colors as they are expanding their vocabulary about clothes and weather.

Language Arts in Greek. The students are exposed to a variety of reading material through topics familiar to them. Some of the children literature books include: The Tortoise and The Hare (An Aesop's fable), The Animals in the Forest, The Animals Chorus, and Picking Apples. Additionally, literature material is being used for the development of social skills. Here are some titles: Manners Please, Hands are Not for Hitting, Feet are Not for Kicking, and Germs are Not for Sharing.

Seasonal themes become part of the curriculum as well. The children explore the meaning of Thanksgiving, Christmas, and Easter through crafts and role-playing activities as they are taught the principles of our Orthodox Christian faith. Our students participate in the Thanksgiving and Valentine's Luncheon of Ladies Philoptohos in order to show service and appreciation to the elderly of the community. There two national days celebrated over the course of the year; OXI Day celebration and March 25 Greek Independence Day celebration.

*Music.* Our music teacher is a classical piano teacher who is Greek-English bilingual. She teaches rhythm and beginning piano skills. Through the Greek and English songs the children early on develop music skills and a trained ear.

**Puppet Theater.** Drama and the art of role-playing are tied to the lesson plan to help the children develop good manners around the table at snack and lunch time, to cultivate social skills and to express emotions.

Language Arts in English. In the afternoon, after a good siesta, our students are immersed into the English children's literature books. The Very Hungry Caterpillar, Biscuit, Chicka Chicka Boom Boom, Anansi the Magic Stick, Harry and the Lady Next Door, and Harry the Dirty Dog" are some of the titles used. Through the books' characters the students are introduced to the letter of the day, build on social skills, and are exposed to other cultures and folk stories ~ way.

**Math.** Using links and other educational material, the students count, measure, graph and learn all about numbers up to 20. By the end of the school year they will have counted all the days being in school with paper links and when the 100<sup>th</sup> day of school is reached we will have a big celebration!

### **BOOK REVIEW**

Precious Vessels of the Holy Spirit: The Lives and Counsels of Contemporary Elders of Greece. 2nd ed. Dr. Herman A. Middleton. Dr. Georgios Mantzaridis, contributor. Yonkers, NY: Protecting Veil Press. 2004. Paperback. 212 pages.

*Previous Vessels* is the result of Middleton's visits to Greece's monasteries while pursuing his doctoral studies there. In his preface, he alludes to the book's evolution and expansion. Beginning as a collection of sayings and counsels of notable elders of the 20<sup>th</sup> century, he ended up with a survey suitable for both the Orthodox and heterodox. The book is a reader-friendly introduction to the ongoing history of holy monastics and valuable to anyone searching for saints in the modern world.

The book opens with an extended essay by Mantzaridis on the place of monastics in the Church, their wherefores and whys. This provides a frame of reference especially for those not familiar with their central role in the Church:

The perfect monk voluntarily shoulders the universal responsibility for the evil that exists in the world....Placing himself beneath all people and considering himself the first among sinners, he encounters Christ's gift as a personal gift. He becomes universal on the level of universal sin and accepts the universal reconciliation with the new life that Christ offers the sinful person...Just as Christ bears within Himself all humanity, so the monk is thus widened and embraces all the world. (35)

Middleton goes on to create profiles of eight elders, several of whom have been canonized since the book's publication, including Elders Paisos, Porphyrios, and George. He provides a hagiography for each and then a sizable collection of their quotations where their true humanity shines forth:

My worst hell is to realize that I have saddened a beloved person. – Elder Epiphanios (79)

The humble are like nightingales that hide in ravines and spread joy to the souls of men with their sweet songs. – Elder (St.) Paisos (132)

You should be joyful! Jesus holds a sculptor's chisel in his hands. He want to make you into a statue for the heavenly palace. – Elder Amphilochios (57)

Neither should wealth impress you, nor honor, but always walk justly. Eat your bread with your honorable sweat and not through unjust means. The things you gain honorably, do not squander aimlessly. Live honorably and humbly, and as much as possible extend your hands in charity.... Knock on the doors of the poor, the sick, the orphans. You should prefer the

### ΕΙΜΑΣΤΕ ΧΡΙΣΤΙΑΝΟΙ

«ΈΛΛΗΣΙ ΤΕ ΚΑΙ ΒΑΡΒΑΡΟΙΣ, σοφοίς τε και ανοήτοις οφειλέτης ειμί. Ούτω το κατ' εμέ πρόθυμον και υμίν τοις εν Ρώμη ευαγγελίσασθαι. Ου γαρ επαισχύνομαι το ευαγγέλιον του Χριστού. Δύναμις γαρ Θεού εστίν εις σωτηρίαν παντί τω πιστεύοντι, Ιουδαίω τε πρώτον και Έλληνι».

Σκοπός αυτού του θέματος είναι να εμπνεύσουμε στον συνάνθρωπό μας την παρρησία για την πίστη τους. Αντιμετωπίζουμε αντιδράσεις και ειρωνείες πολλές φορές έτσι, ώστε έχουμε ανάγκη τόνωσης.

Αφού διαβάσουμε την σχετική Ευαγγελική περικοπή Προς Ρωμαίους, στο κεφάλαιο α΄και ειδικά στους στίχους 14-16, θα λέγαμε με δικά μας λόγια σήμερα ότι δεν ντρεπόμαστε που είμαστε χριστιανοί. Ίσως να έρχονται στιγμές που ντρεπόμαστε να ομολογήσουμε ότι είμαστε χριστιανοί και ότι ακόμη κάποιες φορές να υποκύπτουμε στην ντροπή και στην αισχύνη. Θα μπορέσουμε να απαντήσουμε στο αν σκεφτούμε τους λόγους για τους οποίους μάς κατηγορούν οι άλλοι και μάς κοροϊδεύουν. Συνήθως, ο συνηθέστερος λόγος είναι ότι δεν ζούμε όπως εκείνοι, δεν κάνουμε και δεν λέμε κακό για κανέναν, όπως κάνουν εκείνοι. Αυτό σοκάρει και δημιουργεί αντίθεση, ακόμη το ότι ομολογούμε την πίστη μας και αγωνιζόμαστε γι' αυτή. Σε αυτά συνήθως στηρίζονται οι ειρωνείες, ο άγιος, καλόγερος, η θεούσα, ο καθυστερημένος.

Αναμφισβήτητα δεν είναι νοητό να ντρέπεται κανείς, επειδή είναι σεμνός, αγνός, ξένος προς κάθε ατιμία, επειδή προσπαθεί να ανταποκρίνεται στα καθήκοντά του ή θέλει να μεταδίδει καλό και αλήθεια. Επειδή επιθυμεί να φέρεται κανονικά σε όλες τις περιπτώσεις και να μην διακατέχεται να σπιλώνει το εσωτερικό του. Κι αυτό, επειδή είναι οπαδός του Χριστού! Εντελώς αντίθετα δικαιολογούμε μία καύχηση, μία υπερηφάνεια εσωτερική, «ουκ επαισχύνομαι το Ευαγγέλιο του Χριστού».

Για να απαλλαγούμε λοιπόν από το επαισχύνομαι έτσι, ώστε να φύγει η ντροπή από πάνω μας, καλό είναι να σκεπτόματε και να προσπαθούμε να έχουμε πάντα μπροστά στα μάτια της ψυχής μας την αλήθεια για την πίστη μας. ότι δηλαδή το Ευαγγέλιο είναι «*δύναμις εις σωτηρίαν»*. ### ALL AROUND THE TOWN

BRONZE SCULPTURES OF THE HELLENISTIC PERIOD

Between 334 and 323 B.C., Alexander the Great and his armies conquered much of the known world, creating an empire that stretched from Greece and Asia Minor through Egypt and the Persian empire in the Near East to India. This unprecedented contact with cultures far and wide disseminated Greek culture and its arts, and exposed Greek artistic styles to new exotic influences. The death of Alexander the Great in 323 B.C. traditionally marks the beginning of the Hellenistic period.

Alexander's generals, known as the "Diadochoi", or "successors", divided the conquered lands of his empire into kingdoms of their own. New Hellenistic dynasties were created which maintained Greek art and cultural preferences.

This continued unabated for three centuries; royal palac-

es flourished and commissions were made for sculptures and various articles using the new medium of bronze, which had not only strength and the ability to hold poses, but could show fine detail, allowing the sculptor to show realistic features and expressions of emotion, which characterized Hellenistic sculpture.



Included in this exhibit are various bronze portraits of rulers, the new dynastic heads, as well as young men, athletes and torsos. But new aspects of the athletic "type" were also explored.

Even images of the Gods reflected a new, updated image, a more modern take on their "persona"- a more human one! The conventional end of the Hellenistic period is 31 B.C. with the battle of Actium where Octavian-Emperor Augustus- ended the rule of the Ptolemies, which was the last Hellenistic dynasty to fall to Rome. Interest in Greek art and culture persisted through the Roman Imperial period where Roman artists continued making works in the Hellenistic tradition.

In my experience, looking at images of these sculptures elicits an immediate response to them; it is as if they are imbued with life. And quite mesmerizing.

We are so extremely fortunate that this exhibition is coming here to the NGA, starting on December 13 until March 2016. In my mind, nothing can substitute for the actual seeing and experiencing first-hand any work of art.

We would like to thank Joanna Bose who has written the All Around the Town articles since February 2014. Joanna has informed us that she will be taking a break. We hope she resumes writing soon!


es. For instance, if Thanksgiving is always at your house, let someone else host this year at their home. Another alternative to consider might be going to a favorite restaurant that serves Thanksgiving dinner. My mother, my daughter and I did this on the first Thanksgiving after Mike died. Because we had broken from tradition for that particular "first holiday," we were able to more peacefully enjoy both the day and one another. Or you might choose to go way outside of tradition by taking a mini-vacation. There is nothing wrong with doing something different and perhaps even beginning new traditions of your own.

4. There is a huge difference between "celebrating" and "observing." As opposed to celebrating with a lot of people around or otherwise putting yourself in a situation where you feel that you have to paste a smile on your face in order to be social, there is nothing wrong with quietly observing Thanksgiving (or any holiday for that matter) in whatever way that you wish. This might include attending a church service on the day and making yourself a lovely dinner at home or volunteering at a local shelter or soup kitchen.

Above all else, remember this: Though it may not feel like it right this minute, you do have reasons to be thankful. Stop and take a moment to think about that for which you are thankful—your health, your family, your loved ones, your home and whatever else you treasure in and about your life. Most of all, embrace and remember that you had the love of a wonderful person—whoever that person is—whose legacies of love and memories will be with you always.
